INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS FOR STUDENTS

GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM AND YEAR 7-10 EXTENSION CLASS

Candidates for 7C, an extension class for gifted and talented students, will sit for a test provided and graded by the Australian Council of Educational Research in March, and places will be offered on the basis of these results (this criterion may change). Application to sit for the test must be made to the school. The extension stream continues into the later years of secondary school with specific classes for English, HSIE, Mathematics and Science.

THE LEARNING & CITIZENSHIP PASSPORT

Student achievement in the areas of Learning & Citizenship is recognised and re-inforced at Cronulla High School by the use of a multi-level merit system. Students are responsible for maintaining their folder and all certificates for the entire time they are at Cronulla. Students can reach bronze, silver and gold levels through their efforts. The award of the gold medal includes a \$100 gift card from the P & C in recognition of long and outstanding achievement.

RECOGNISING ACHIEVEMENT

Academic, sporting, cultural and community achievements are recognised and rewarded at Cronulla High School with a range of prizes and awards over and above the Learning & Citizenship Passport. Cash performance incentives are donated to the school by businesses and individuals in the community. These groups actively support our goal of recognising student achievement. These include academic, sporting and performing arts awards and scholarships. The P&C also fund awards to the first three place-getters in each year's HSC and subsidise the costs of students representing the school in a variety of activities including but not limited to leadership, sporting, performing, creative and debating activities. This array of awards ensures that achievement is publicly recognised and valued across the school.

TAFE TASTER PROGRAMS

Cronulla High School is well aware of the need to give students a competitive edge for their future. The TAFE Taster Program creates a vital link between secondary education and the work force.

Students in year 9 and 10 are given the opportunity to gain 'hands on' experience in a variety of trade areas. The areas offered are in plumbing, automotive, electrical, clerical, hairdressing, marketing and accounting, hospitality and tourism, outdoor recreation and fitness instruction. The program offers students an opportunity to learn about their own suitability for a particular trade or profession and come to appreciate the relevance of secondary education in helping them pursue their career paths. Additionally, if students are interested in pursuing a building career, they are encouraged to participate in a Work Health and Safety Course.

Other positive outcomes for students include improved co-operative team building, communication, problem-solving and decision making skills as well as learning appropriate conduct in a range of social situations. Work Experience in Year 10 builds on this program.

LITERACY PROGRAMS

Cronulla High School has implemented several major programs to develop student literacy. All students in Year 7 participate in these programs in English classes, small group withdrawal and in other classes across the curriculum. The improvement in literacy levels is demonstrated by the above state average performance of our students at the NAPLAN and Higher School Certificate.

LITERACY SUPPORT

Cronulla High School aims to empower young people to achieve personal success in their academic and social learning in a safe, stimulating and inclusive environment. Our school provides learning opportunities for students to seek growth in the three main literacy elements as identified by the National Literacy Learning Progressions which includes 'Speaking and Listening, Reading and Viewing, and Writing'. We support this through our implementation of Literacy Planet, an online literacy program that helps improve student learning outcomes through fun, engaging and curriculum aligned games.

TEXT TYPES

For students to be literate they must also be able to write appropriately for a range of different purposes in all subjects. The functional model of language teaches the types of writing or text types that students need in order to learn successfully. These text types are subject specific eg a report in History or Science, a narrative in English, and must be taught within the context of that subject.

All Year 7 and 8 students learn to read, analyse and write a range of text types across the curriculum. Clear understanding of the purpose and structure of text types has dramatically improved the standard of students' writing and their performance in public examinations. With the emphasis on text types all teachers are assuming responsibility for literacy and providing students with the tools of critical literacy they will need in everyday life.

STAR - Sit Together And Read

The STAR program runs after recess each day (excluding Thursdays) for all students in Years 7-11. During STAR, students read in silence a novel of their choosing. Students are expected to bring a novel each day for this purpose. The STAR program aims to develop students' enjoyment of reading, promote stronger connections to school through vertical class groupings and enhance student literacy.

High expectations of student behaviour and engagement are in place in STAR, as they are in every other lesson of the day. This will include:

- positive reinforcement verbally and in the form of Merit Awards to students who are excelling during STAR classes
- attitude and participation during STAR on student Academic Reports each semester
- disciplinary action will be taken for non-compliance with behavioural expectations or failing to bring a novel

HOMEWORK CENTRE

The Homework Centre is running every Wednesday, before and after school. Two teachers will be in the library from 8am to 8:40am and 3:10 to 4.15pm, to help students with their studies, whether it be homework, assessment tasks, or just providing a space for students with computer and printer facilities. The Homework Centre is a valuable tool for students to maximise their study time.

The Senior Homework Centre is run on Mondays from 3.10 - 4.30pm. This is held in the new MHUB room for Seniors only and they work with senior teachers on Homework, Assessments and Study.

The Homework Centre will be supervised every session by teachers. The teachers are there to help out with homework and assessment tasks and provide you with one-on-one support.

The Homework Centre is beneficial for all students as it provides an opportunity for you to complete homework and assignments in a quiet and supportive environment in which you will have access to the internet, computers, printers and books.

PEER SUPPORT PROGRAM - THE TRANSITION TO HIGH SCHOOL

Our older students take very seriously their role of welcoming new students to the school. Our students learn how to support each other in a caring and friendly environment, so that new arrivals can feel accepted and secure in their new school. Our older students also develop skills such as decision-making, assertiveness and leadership.

Year 10 leaders are specifically trained in communication and group dynamics through the Peer Support Program. The success of this program is shown in the positive comments Year 7 students make each year regarding the friendliness and helpfulness of older students.

SRC (Student Representative Council) / STUDENT LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

The SRC and The Student Leadership Program assist students to develop the knowledge, attitudes and skills they need to take on leadership roles, fulfill their potential and contribute positively to society. The program builds student self-esteem by providing many opportunities to contribute positively to the school. These include organising and assisting with various group activities and engaging in organised discussions and debates on student issues. Students will develop skills such as decision-making, assertiveness and public speaking.

Students also learn how to support each other in a structured, caring and friendly environment. The program runs throughout the year and also includes activities such as managing morning assemblies, speaking at parent meetings and representing the school at formal occasions. Captains, Prefects and SRC undertake a leadership skills program. The SRC also raises funds throughout the year for charities and to sponsor talented students who represent the school.

PUBLIC SPEAKING AND DEBATING

All students are encouraged to participate in public speaking and debating as part of the regular curriculum and also as extra curricular activities. Assistance is provided for all students interested in developing their skills and in participating in inter-school or inter-class competitions. Students learn how to express their ideas fluently and confidently, how to think on their feet and how to develop and support logical argument.

RECOGNITION & REINFORCEMENT OF STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

LEARNING & CITIZENSHIP PASSPORT SYSTEM

Student achievement is recognised and reinforced at Cronulla High School by the use of a multi-level merit system.

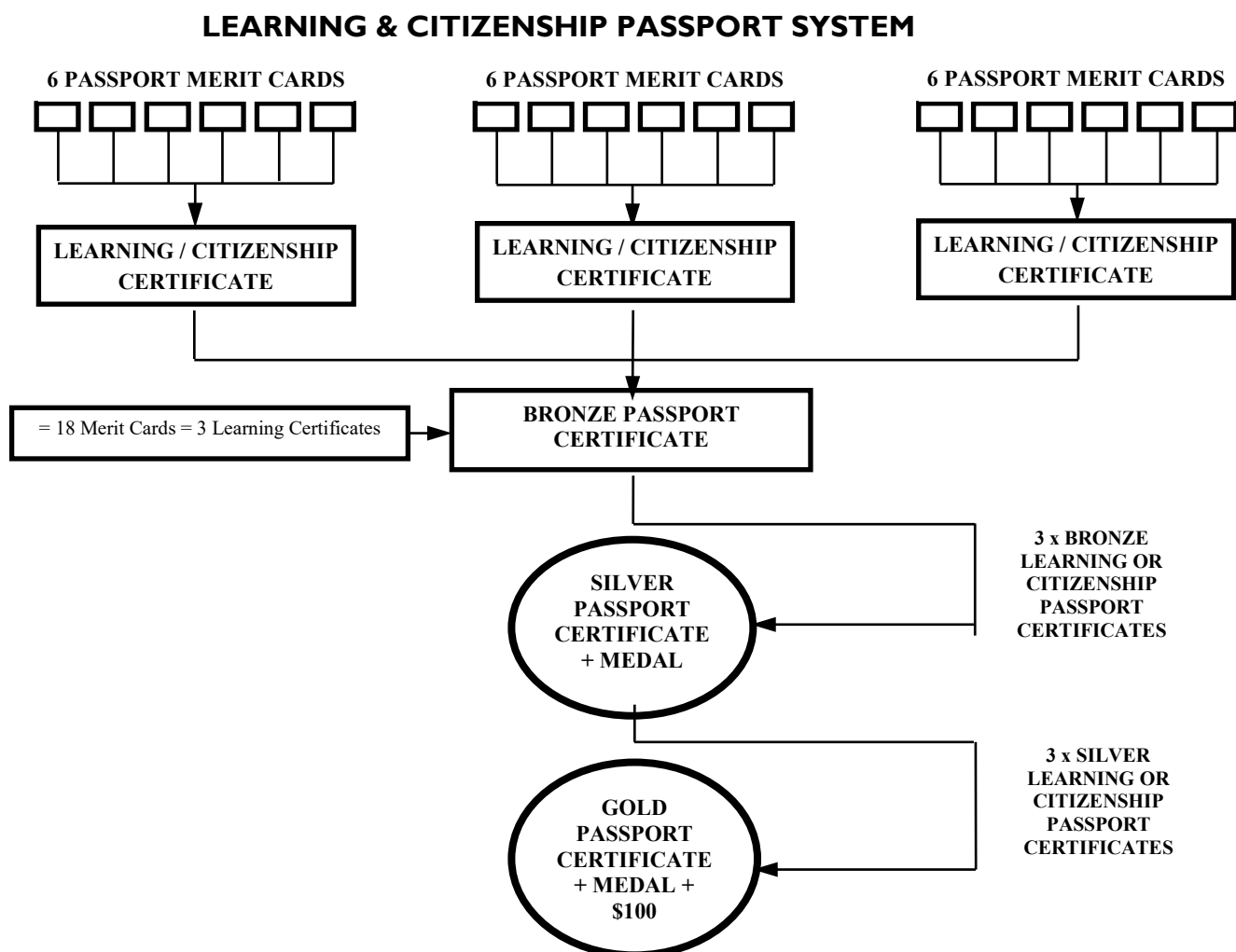
The system recognizes student achievement in any of the areas of:

Learning: Critical and Logical Thinking Skills, Creative Thinking Skills, Information Skills, Communication Skills, Self-Management Skills and Interpersonal Skills.

Achievement: Volunteering, Helping students, Helping the School, Serving the Community, Honesty and Integrity, Working for a cause.

Students receive Learning Merit Cards (blue) for good performance or behaviour or Citizenship Merit Cards (purple) for demonstrating active citizenship. When students accumulate six cards, they bring these to the Deputy Principal, pasted into the sheets in their Learning and Citizenship Passport folder. The Deputy Principal will convert these six cards for a Merit Certificate. When students accumulate three Merit Certificates, the Principal will arrange a Bronze Certificate. This sequence is set out in the flowchart below.

Students track their own performance by arranging their own Learning and Citizenship Passport folder which must be presented to the Deputy Principal or the Principal when “cashing in” cards or certificates. A gift card for \$100.00 from the P&C is also awarded with a Gold Medal and Certificate.

EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES

COMPUTER RESOURCES

Cronulla High School's pedagogical approach emphasises the integration of computer technology into learning programs. There are four well-equipped computer rooms and data projection technology in all learning spaces. Connectivity is provided by a wireless network that is installed across the school. Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) program operates in all years.

All computer workstations have the latest software including the Adobe Creative Cloud Suite, Microsoft Office Professional and other specialist software. Emphasis is placed on student computer literacy at Cronulla High and our computer resources are constantly updated in order to keep pace with current industry and commercial standards. All students in Year 7 and 8 undertake Computing Studies and are guided by teachers in the use of the software applications available.

eDiary

- Entries from the school calendar are automatically posted to the eDiary.
- Homework is assigned by teachers and appears in the students' eDiary.
- Students can post to eDiary to remind themselves of school based work.
- Students can post to eDiary reminders and their work, social or sporting commitments. There are a number of Content Pages accessible on eDiary relating to school – remember. that the School Website is the most complete source of information.
- Students school timetable is displayed in eDiary.

Moodle is a Learning Management System (LMS) and is the e-learning platform for delivery of subjects. Wherever there is Internet access, Moodle is available to staff and students. Each subject has its own course and contains assessment summaries, assessment details and notifications, course notes, quizzes, glossaries, forums, wiki's and blogs.

School App

Developed in partnership with Digistorm Education, the Cronulla app is designed to allow Cronulla High School parents, teachers and students to access important information about events and daily activities. Available for free download for IOS devices and Android devices.

LIBRARY

The school library has an extensive range of fiction as well as reference books and is open to students before school, at recess and at lunchtime. The library staff is available at recess and lunchtime to assist students with research.

As well as being equipped with the latest photocopying machine for student use, there are computers, wireless technology and a computer room set up for student use with access to multimedia software and also to the internet.

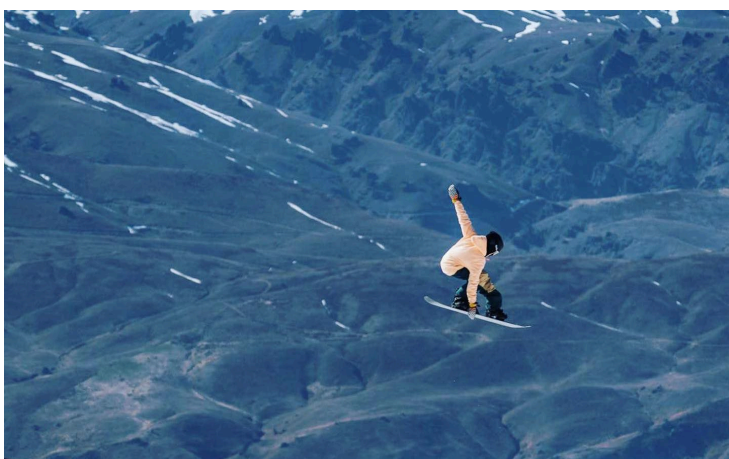
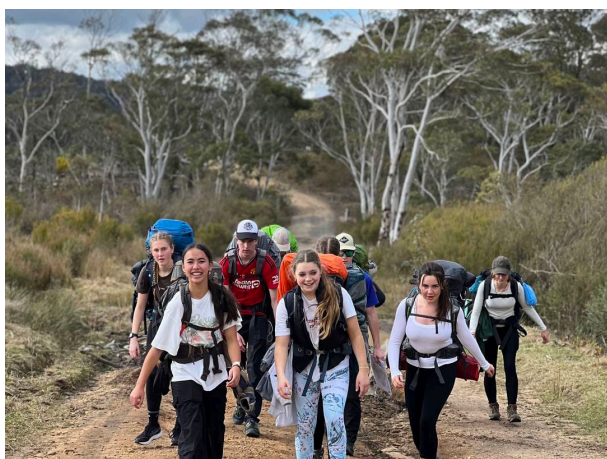

In Year 7, students explore the critical and imaginative use of the English language in its various textual forms. These encompass spoken, written and visual texts through which meaning is shaped, conveyed, interpreted and reflected.

How do we teach English?

The aim of English in Year 7 is to enable students to use, understand, appreciate, reflect on and enjoy the English language in a variety of texts and to shape meaning in ways that are imaginative, interpretive, critical and powerful. This is achieved through our exciting and challenging programs and assessments that have been framed by the Australian Curriculum.

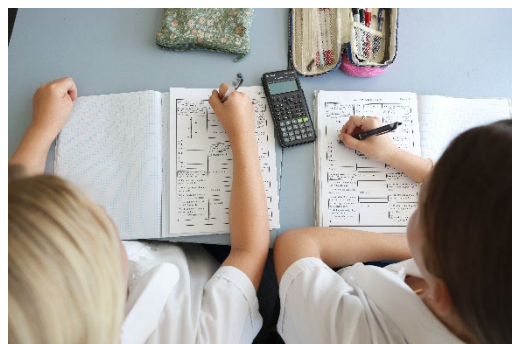

What is Mathematics about?

There are 3 outcomes in which Mathematics and its related content are organised in:

- number and algebra
- measurement and space
- statistics and probability

Within these outcomes, the following Working mathematically processes are embedded:

- communicating
- understanding and fluency
- reasoning
- problem solving.

Students learn to work mathematically by using these processes in an interconnected way. The coordinated development of these processes results in students becoming mathematically proficient.

The aim is to develop students' mathematical thinking, understanding, competence and confidence in the application of mathematics, their creativity, enjoyment and appreciation of the subject, and their engagement in lifelong learning.

How will I be taught Mathematics?

Students will develop knowledge, understanding and skills in Mathematics through discovery, practice and the use of technology.

What is Science about?

Science provides a distinctive view and way of thinking about the world. The study of science provides explanations for a variety of phenomena and enables sense to be made of the biological, physical and technological world.

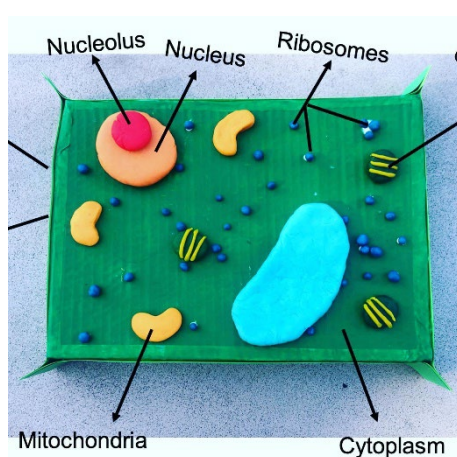
The study of science provides opportunities for students to become independent learners and promotes their development of informed attitudes towards science and the environment.

By engaging students in a range of learning experiences, they are led to a more scientific understanding of their world and the way that scientists work.

An understanding of science and its social and cultural contexts provides a basis for future choices and ethical decisions about local and global applications and implications of science.

How will I be taught Science?

Students develop the skills of working scientifically by engaging in thinking critically and creatively in problem-solving processes. Students work individually and in teams in planning and conducting investigations.

What are the HSIE subjects about?

In Year 7 students are provided with opportunities to investigate a wide range of places and environments from local to global scales.

In Year 7 History students are introduced to the methods used by historians to investigate the past. Students then investigate the Ancient World including early human remains and the establishment of ancient societies like Egypt and China.

How will I be taught these subjects?

The aim of Geography in Year 7 is to stimulate students' enjoyment of and interest in the interaction of a wide variety of places and environments from local to global scales. The aim of History in Year 7 is to stimulate students' enjoyment of and interest in exploring and developing a critical understanding of the past. In both subject's students are taught to participate in the community as active, informed and responsible citizens.

The two subjects are taught on a semester basis.

What are the TAS subjects about?

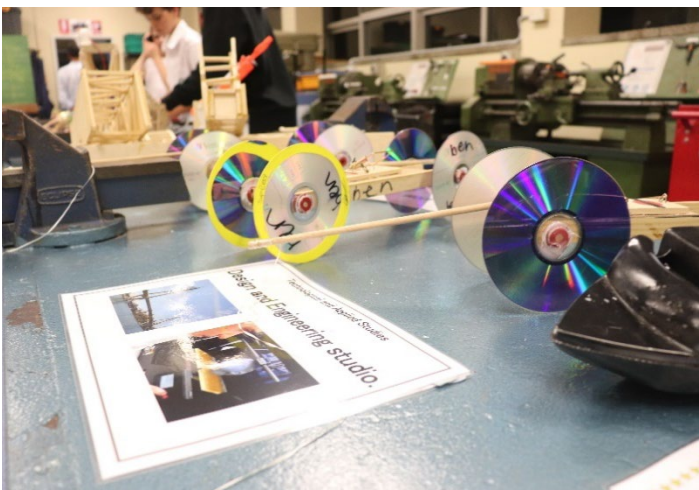
While undertaking Technology Mandatory in Years 7 & 8, students will complete units of work involving theory and practical components in Home Economics and Industrial Arts.

How will I be taught these subjects?

Technology Mandatory engages students in the design process. Solutions are developed for identified needs and opportunities. Through practical applications and through gained knowledge and understanding, students will learn about Agriculture & Food Technologies, Digital Technologies, Engineered Systems and Material Technologies.

Technology Mandatory is a broad introduction to subjects which each student may choose as an elective to study in years 9, 10, 11 & 12.

What is Computing Studies about?

- Stage 4 (Yrs 7/8): **Computing Studies**
Students will learn about computer technology as an Educational Tool to be used in all subjects.
- Stage 5 (Yrs 9/10): **Industrial Technology Multimedia Technologies**
Students will learn about the use and application of Multimedia in Industry.
- Stage 6 (Yrs 11/12): **Industrial Technology Multimedia Technologies**
Students will learn about the use and application of Multimedia in Industry.

How will I be taught Computing Studies?

Stage 4 (Yrs 7/8): Computing Studies

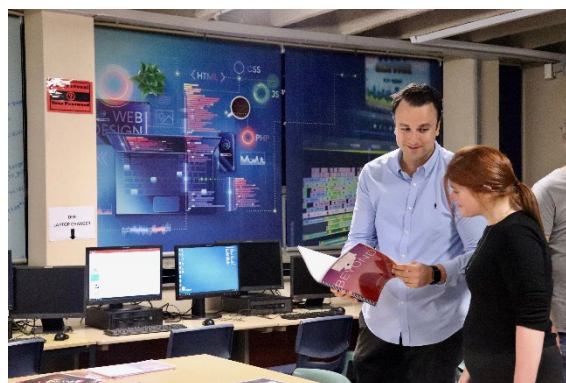
Students learn to design and create Magazines, Apps, Presentations, Documents, Spreadsheets, Websites, Videos, and Animations and use both Microsoft & Adobe Suite. Students learn to do basic coding using Construct 3.

Stage 5 (Yrs 9/10): Industrial Technology Multimedia

Students spend 90% of their class time creating projects. These projects include Videos, Interactive Magazines, Digital Graphics Folios, 3D Modelling, Animations, 2D & 3D Games using Construct 3, Websites and Apps. Students also have the opportunity to complete an individual or group project using their choice of software. All projects involve the use of the Adobe Suite and in particular Photoshop where students develop their design skills.

Stage 6 (Yrs 11/12): Industrial Technology Multimedia Technologies

Students will develop knowledge and understanding of the multimedia industry and its related technologies with an emphasis on design, management and production through practical application. Students will create a Minor Project in Year 11 of their own choice and a Major Project for their HSC that is externally marked. Students have access to a wide variety of software including 2D and 3D Game Engines, Adobe Suite and Microsoft products.

What is PDHPE about?

Personal Development, Health and Physical Education explores many issues which affect young people, such as mental health, discrimination, gender roles, physical activity, sexual health, drug use and personal safety. These are the issues which are likely to have an impact on the health and wellbeing of themselves and others. Learning in PDHPE encourages young people to take a positive approach to managing their lives and equips them with skills for current and future challenges.

How will I be taught PDHPE?

PDHPE includes theoretical and practical components. Students will study units of work which have specific focus, whilst developing broader skills, such as resilience and assertiveness. Practical lessons also have an emphasis on improving movement skills and enjoying a variety of traditional and non-traditional sports and activities.

JAPANESE

Subjects studied / offered in Japanese

Stage 4 (Yrs 7/8):	Japanese Introduction (Year 8)

What is Japanese about?

As a part of the compulsory 100hrs language study students in Year 8 explore Japanese as a foreign language and culture. They will develop the knowledge, understanding and the listening, reading, speaking and writing skills necessary for effective interaction in Japanese. Students will also develop knowledge of the Japanese culture, thereby encouraging reflection on their own cultural heritage.

How will I be taught Japanese?

Japanese is taught targeting the four key language skills:

- Reading
- Writing
- Listening
- Speaking

Students participate in interactive classroom activities – language games, oral and aural exercises and computer based tasks. Language immersion days at a nearby Japanese cultural centre are a part of the Year 8 program. There is also an opportunity to travel to Japan for 2 weeks in Years 9, 10 or 11 to participate in our sister school program.



CREATIVE AND PERFORMING ARTS - DANCE

What is Dance about?

Dance involves the development of physical skill as well as aesthetic, artistic and cultural understanding. Cronulla High School provides students with the opportunity to think imaginatively and share ideas, feelings, values and attitudes while physically and intellectually exploring the communication of ideas through movement.

How will I be taught Dance?

Learning in dance and learning through dance enables students to apply their own experiences to their study of dance. They learn to express ideas creatively as they make and perform dances, and analyse dance as works of art.

Within the curriculum, students at Cronulla High School are able to choose Dance as an elective subject in Years 9 & 10 and also study Dance for the HSC.

Stage 5 Dance (Years 9 & 10): Dance elective.

Stage 6 Dance (Years 11 & 12): HSC 2 Unit elective.

Co-Curricular Activities

All students are able to audition at the beginning of the year to be part of various dance groups which are run as co-curricular activities. The ensembles offered are the Elite Dance Company, Training Dance Company, Conditioning Dance Ensemble, Junior Dance Ensembles and the Cronulla High School Show group. These selected students are provided with several opportunities to perform throughout the year including the Sutherland Dance Festival, Southern Stars, Sydney Regional Dance Festival, State Dance Festival, Schools Spectacular and School Musical. Our School Show group have participated in our performing arts tours to Queensland, Los Angeles, and New York. We also have casual classes for those who choose not to perform. Over the last three years dance at Cronulla High School has grown and flourished with the progress of these dance groups. Students now have access to invaluable experiences which contribute to their whole development.



CREATIVE AND PERFORMING ARTS - DRAMA

What is Drama about?

Drama is a popular subject taught at Cronulla High School. The collaborative nature of this artform engages students in the creative process of sharing, developing and expressing ideas and stories suitable for performance. Students interested in this area can choose one or more of the following pathways in which to participate.

How will I be taught Drama?

Students will develop knowledge, understanding and skills in Drama through the components of Making, Performing and Appreciating. This is delivered through practical workshop activities, improvisation, script work, live performance and the study of theatrical practitioners. Within the curriculum, students at Cronulla High School are able to choose Drama as an elective subject in Years 9 & 10 and also study Drama for the HSC.

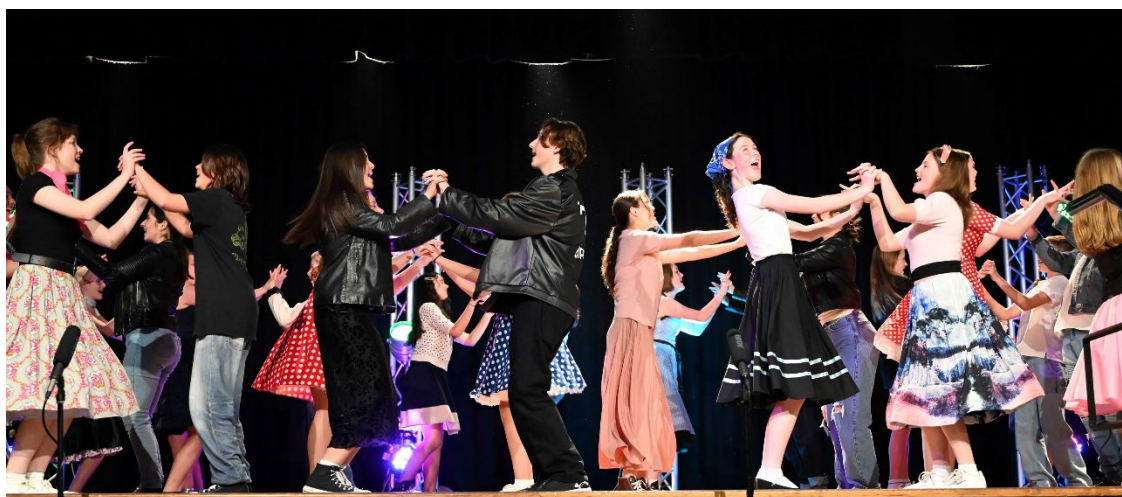
Stage 5 Drama (Years 9 & 10): Drama elective.

Co-Curricular Activities

The Drama ensembles offered are the Year 7 Drama Ensemble, Year 8 Drama Ensemble and Elective Drama Ensemble. All Drama ensembles are designed to meet the needs, interests and performance skills of the individual. Students meet weekly and the learning experience is based on the collaborative development of performances produced for School Productions and Musicals, Regional and State Drama Festivals. Many of our students have successfully auditioned for a position in both the State Drama Ensemble and State Drama Company. In 2018 our year 8 Drama Ensemble performed at Schools Spectacular. Participation in these drama ensembles provides ideal learning opportunities for those students considering HSC Drama.

The Drama Company have participated in our tours to Queensland and Los Angeles where they performed on Hollywood Boulevard and Universal Studios. In 2018 students from the Drama Company participated in our New York tour where they enjoyed five Broadway shows, several performance workshops, and an opportunity to perform to a local high school.

What is Music about?

Music allows for the expression of emotion and imagination, the intellect and the exploration of values. The study of music also allows students to develop their capacity to manage their own learning, to engage in problem solving individually and collaboratively, and to develop a lifelong appreciation and enjoyment of music.

How will I be taught Music?

Students will develop knowledge, understanding and skills in Music through performance, composition, improvisation and listening activities. Each learning experience will provide a balance of these integrated activities. Students will also be given the opportunity to engage with ICT throughout the Music course in a variety of ways.

Co-Curricular Activities

From the following school-based ensembles, CHS Concert Band, Stage Band, Vocal Ensemble, Selective Vocal Ensemble, Drumline and Instrumental Ensembles, nominated students will be given the opportunity to participate in representative organisations such as The Arts Unit ensembles, Sydney Region Band, State Music Camps, the Schools Spectacular, Sing NSW, Youth Rock, OzTunes and school and community performing arts exposés. Students also have the opportunity to participate in instrumental and vocal tuition throughout the school day as part of the Music program's co-curricular activities at Cronulla High School.

What is Visual Arts about?

Visual Arts places great value on the development of student's creativity and imagination, problem solving, reflective action and critical judgement in the making of art. Expressive forms explored include painting, drawing, sculpture, ceramics, printmaking, photography, filmmaking, design and digital media. It builds an understanding of the role of the artist, audience, artwork, in society, and thus is a platform to develop knowledge and understanding of cultures across time and place, as well as many social and environmental issues facing us in our contemporary world.

How will I be taught Visual Arts?

The course is mostly practical and suits the creative, self-motivated student who enjoys the challenge of lateral thinking. Art criticism and history is integrated with art making. They learn to represent their ideas with reference to contemporary trends and how artists comment on society. Students learn tools to help analyse and understand artworks from a variety of viewpoints. Visual literacy and critical thinking skills are developed along with persuasive writing.

Co-Curricular Activities

Students are given an opportunity to brush up on skills in our weekly Art Club and to join our Photography Club run by a professional photographer, and in 2018 Visual Arts students joined us on our international tour to New York. In 2023 we started a Street Art Club which worked alongside the Sutherland Shire Council and local businesses and artists to create artworks in the local community.

Exhibition is an important aspect of visual arts, thus a major art exhibition is held each year in Term 3, with all student having at least one artwork on display. Cronulla High School students are regularly represented in ArtExpress and Art Rules Exhibitions at Hazelhurst Gallery.





What is Entertainment Industry about?

A nationally accredited Certificate III in Live Production and Services together with a HSC award in Entertainment Industry is offered at CHS. This subject also provides 70-hour industry work placement component. In previous years our students achieved excellent results and have twice received the state's third highest result in the state for Entertainment VET in the Higher School Certificate. Many of our students have gone on to work professionally in the entertainment industry or have continued their studies at a tertiary level in specific areas of production such as Audio, Staging, Lighting and Vision.

How will I be taught Entertainment Industry?

Students are exposed to a range of related opportunities in event production and technical operations. Cronulla High School provides industry standard audio, lighting, vision and staging equipment which promotes training of a superior and industry level standard. Our Entertainment students form an integral part of CHS productions including the musical, Music Night, Arts in the Dark, and formal assemblies.



Cronulla High School Concert Band & Stage Band Program

Concert Band has been established and ongoing for many years. This flagship ensemble is currently directed by a Music teacher in collaboration with three instrumental tutors. Concert Band perform at formal school assemblies and events, and in 2023, delivered workshops and performances at local primary schools. In Term 4 of 2024, this ensemble will tour to Melbourne. Concert Band currently has 20 students enrolled across flutes, bassoon, clarinets, alto and tenor saxophones, trumpets, trombone, baritone horn, and percussion. Concert Band perform suitably challenging repertoire, usually of a minimum Grade 2/3 standard. Stage Band perform jazz and popular music repertoire to a refined standard. This auditioned ensemble allows students to continue to develop their ensemble playing, improvisation skills, and rudiments associated with jazz standards. Stage Band regularly collaborate with our elite vocalists as soloists.

Cronulla High School offers a tuition program for those students who wish to further develop musical skills in Guitar, Vocals, Piano, Strings, Woodwind and Brass as required.

Students from our band programs are regularly selected to participate in various prestigious bands and music camps including the State Schools Symphonic Wind Orchestra, State Music Camps, Sydney Region Band and the Schools Spectacular, representing Cronulla High School at metropolitan, regional and state levels.

Students are given the opportunity to audition for our Performing Arts Tours. In the past we have toured Queensland, Los Angeles, where performance venues included Disneyland, Hollywood Boulevard, and Universal Studios, and in 2018 our tour took place in New York.

The Concert Band rehearses after school on a weekly basis and performs music at an appropriate skill level – one that is both challenging and achievable.

Cronulla High School Vocal Ensemble

The CHS Vocal Ensemble perform at various school events throughout the year, including the school musical, and at events in the wider community. Our students regularly audition successfully to perform in the Schools Spectacular and Core Choirs and have also represented Cronulla High School in State Choir, Sing NSW, Sydney City Eisteddfod and at State Senior Music Camp. CHS Vocal Ensemble has participated in the Expanding Horizons concert at the Sydney Opera House and also performed for the Cronulla RSL as the featured choir at the ANZAC Day Dawn Service at Monro Park. CHS Vocal Ensemble rehearses after school on a weekly basis. Selected members of CHS Vocal Ensemble are given the opportunity to participate in our overseas Performing Arts Tours, and at various school and community events. In 2018, our Vocal Ensemble joined the performing arts tour to New York where a highlight was singing to a large audience in the One World Observatory Tower.

Dance, Drama, and Music Ensembles and Tuition

Ensembles are offered for all Creative and Performing Arts subjects for all students at all levels of ability. Every year these ensembles enjoy numerous performance opportunities, offering students valuable learning experiences that help to develop their skills while engaging in activity that reflects real world practice. Over the past few years, several ensembles and solo artists from Cronulla High School have auditioned successfully for inclusion in competitions such as Southern Stars, Sutherland Dance Festival, Battle of the Bands, Youth Rock, Regional Drama and State Drama for three years running.

Vocal and instrumental tuition is also offered to students throughout the day from professional tutors to assist in the development of student's gifts and talents.

Cronulla High School offers opportunities for all students to use our excellent facilities including a purpose-built music studio which includes a recording studio.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND SPORTS UNIFORM – BOYS and GIRLS

Track Suit	Taslon top and pants in school colours with school crest on the top.
Shoes	Fully covered leather or synthetic uppers. Must be cross training or running style with wedge type shock absorption midsole. (No flat soles such as 'volleys' etc)
Socks	Any suitable mostly white sports socks or school socks that are visible when worn and cover the ankles.
Hats	Blue school cap with 3D CHS motif (available for purchase at school office). Years 7 & 8 must wear hats for PE & Sport classes and hats are optional for the other year groups.

Full sports uniform must be worn on Thursday. Some grade sports teams will require specific uniforms to suit the type of sport. The team coaches or Sports Organiser will advise these requirements. These specific uniforms must not be worn to school. All other sports, both house and grade, must wear the standard sports uniform above.

SKIRT LENGTH The bottom of the skirt should sit no more than 15cm higher than the middle of the knee cap.

BAGS A suitable school bag/backpack must be used to carry books and equipment. Handbags are not acceptable.

JEWELLERY All jewellery is subject to School and DoE WH&S requirements as such any item deemed unsafe by staff will need to be removed immediately. Small discrete sleepers may be worn in ears. Any other facial piercings are strongly discouraged and if worn are only to be small and discreet studs. No student will be permitted to have official school photos taken wearing facial piercings. A single wristband, watch or bracelet may be worn. These must be removed for any practical classes or sporting activity.

MAKE-UP AND NAILS Only a minimum amount of make-up may be worn. Nails must be natural and kept short. No false nails.

HAIR COLOUR AND STYLE Only conservative, natural colours and style may be worn. Bright or unnatural colours or unusual hair styles are not acceptable.
